THE ACADEMIC ESSAY - Guidelines II

OBJECTIVES

The assignment to write an academic essay during this semester has the following complementary objectives:

- Teach you to analyse and understand the chosen topic;
- Research the topic, formulate theses and plan the overall structure of your essay;
- Find more information and use a variety of sources;
- Process the information and organise it in clear paragraphs;
- Organise your paragraphs in a logical and coherent text;
- Use adequate and accurate English;
- Avoid plagiarism;
- Improve and redraft your essay;
- Edit and proofread.

GUIDELINES

- 1. Start by analysing the essay topic: this will tell you what type of essay you will be writing, e.g. descriptive, argumentative, expository, personal experience essay, or indeed you may choose to use a mixture of different approaches and types.
- 2. Whatever the type of the essay it always has the following overarching elements: introduction, body and conclusion.
- 3. A good introduction should both adequately introduce the topic and encourage the reader's interest in the work. It should also contain a thesis statement which shows how you intend to discuss and develop the topic.
- 4. The body of the essay should present your ideas in a clear and structured way, through logical and meaningful paragraphs, which contain well-developed arguments and discussions supported by relevant evidence and credible information. Depending on the type of your essay the body may use different organisational patterns, e.g. reasons for and reasons against, causes followed by effects, problems followed by solutions. Each paragraph should be well-organised and well-developed. The cohesion between paragraphs should be enhanced by the use of linking words or phrases.
- 5. The main function of the conclusion is to demonstrate to the reader that you have managed to address the topic successfully, therefore it should link to the thesis statement in your introduction without, of course, simply repeating it or repeating the arguments presented in the body of the essay. Importantly, the conclusion should not contain any new information or new developments of the topic.
- 6. All parts of the essay should be both cohesive and coherent. A text is cohesive if its elements are linked together it is coherent if it makes sense.

- 8. An important criterion for assessing your work will be the quality of the research you have done for your essay, so basically the more and more credible sources you use the better. It is however equally important how you use your sources! You are free to use all kinds of sources, e.g. books, the Web, interviews, etc. as long as you honestly and accurately reference them. Generally, there are two ways of avoiding plagiarism: citing (reporting ideas and data using your own words) and quoting (using verbatim the words of your source). In both cases this must be accurately indicated in the paper both by an in-text citation and an entry in the Works Cited section, in the form

- 9. The MLA Formatting and Style Guide should also be followed in relation to all aspects of your work concerning the formatting and layout of your paper.
- 10. When editing and redrafting essays you should use a clear system of reviewing your work according to 5 criteria: relevance to the topic, support and development of ideas, organisation and logical structure, academic style, adequacy and accuracy of the language (register, syntax, grammar, lexis, spelling). Your essay will be evaluated by the instructor based on the same criteria.
- 11. In addition to the guidelines from the first semester, special attention will be paid to your ability to think and write critically, i.e. your ability to structure logically consistent arguments and to support them with relevant and reliable evidence.

LENGTH

The length of the essay should be between 1000 and 1500 words.

ESSAY TOPICS

You need to choose one of the following topics:

- 1. Can a selfish person be a loyal friend?
- 2. Nurture vs. Nature: What affects human behaviour and personality more?
- 3. When it comes to fostering relationships, is ignorance bliss or is honesty the best policy?
- 4. To what extent do you agree or disagree that peer pressure in its various forms can never be withstood completely?
- 5. Would you agree that fulfilled dreams sometimes lead to greater disillusionment than broken ones?

Alternatively, subject to approval by instructor, formulate your own topic based on your extensive reading book.

DEADLINES

The first draft of each essay must be submitted by 25 May 2014 via Moodle. Essays will be then allocated for peer editing. Peer edited essays will be forwarded to both the author and the instructor by 1 June 2014 via Moodle. The second improved draft of the essay must be submitted to the instructor by 8 June 2014 via Moodle. The portfolio containing the first draft, the peer reviewed draft, the second draft and final draft must be printed, bound and submitted to the instructor on the day of the exam.

EVALUATION

Each essay will award a maximum of 100 points = 20 for relevance to the topic, 20 for support and development of ideas, 20 for organisation and logical structure, 20 for academic style (adherence to the MLA Formatting and Style Guide), 20 for adequacy and accuracy of the language. If an essay scores 0 points by any of these criteria, the final cumulative score will not be awarded and the assignment will be considered failed.

PEER EDITING INSTRUCTIONS

Peer editors will review the essay allocated to them on the basis of five criteria: a) relevance to the topic (Is the topic well understood? Do all paragraphs address the topic?); b) support and development of ideas (Is the information contained in the essay well-researched? Has the author used convincing and sufficient sources?); c) organisation and logical structure (Are the paragraphs well-organised, e.g. topic sentence, supporting information, concluding sentence? Are the paragraphs organised in a clear logical structure? Is the whole text cohesive and coherent? Are the introduction and the conclusion written in accordance with academic standards?); d) academic style (adherence to the MLA Formatting and Style Guide); e) adequacy and accuracy of the language. Peer editors will correct / suggest improvements to the text. IMPORTANT: All changes and additions to the paper must be tracked:
